# Structure, governance and management

Rights of Women is a company limited by guarantee, Rights of Women Incorporated Limited (number 8002509) and a registered charity (number 1147913) with the Charity Commission.

The Board of Trustees met 6 times during the year. During this period the Board of Trustees has undertaken an active recruitment process to extend the skills and expertise of the Board, including financial skills. On 5 November Fiona Bauermeister, Fiona Dwyer, Shannon Harvey, Eilidh Macpherson and Wendy Scott were appointed to the Board. Fredericka Marquis resigned as Treasurer at the AGM on 5 February and Wendy Scott has been appointed as Acting Treasurer whilst a recruitment process for the Treasurer role takes place. At the Annual General Meeting on 5 February 2015 Sanchita Hosali also resigned from the Board. Annie Hedge was subsequently re-elected as Chair at the Board meeting on 5 February. Following the very successful recruitment process for Board members, the Board has formed a Board Advisory Group made up of expert women lawyers who meet twice a year to support the organisation's strategic and services development. The Chair is actively engaged in a process of Board development for new and established Trustees.

The day to day management of the organisation continues to be delegated to the Director. Emma Scott remains Director, assisted during this period in the delivery of the organisation's services by our Head of Law, Catherine Briddick in July 2014 and our Senior Legal Officer, Ruth Tweedale. In August 2014 our Services and Administration Officer left the post and the Board made a strategic decision to separate out the finance functions of this roles from the administration and service delivery functions. Anna Salva was recruited to the Services and Administration Officer post and Rosemarie Koroma to the new Finance Officer post in September 2014. The Board continues to employ an external financial consultant, Ken Hercules, to undertake the management accounting.

Our direct services for women continue to be supported by our team of about 40 volunteer women barrister and solicitors. We have also been supported in our administration by a number of office volunteers. The Board of Trustees would like to acknowledge the very significant commitment and energy of the Rights of Women staff team and volunteers in the delivery of our vital services for women.

# Objectives and activities

The Memorandum and Articles of Association of Rights of Women state the objects of the organisation to be restricted to:-

- (a) the elimination of discrimination on the grounds of gender;
- (b) advancing the education of women and raising awareness of equality and diversity;
- (c) commissioning and conducting research on gender equality and diversity issues and publishing the results to the public;
- (d) cultivating a sentiment in favour of equality of women and diversity;
- (e) campaigning in relation to gender equality and diversity issues and in furtherance of the elimination of discrimination on the grounds of gender
- (f) conducting policy work in relation to gender equality and diversity issues

#### Strategic Plan 2015-2017

On 18 September 2014 the Board of Trustees held a strategic planning day to review and plan for the development of our services and activities. 2013 and 2014 saw very significant developments in law and policy affecting women and which have also impacted on the need for and models of delivery for our services.

At this away day the Board made a commitment to continuing our focus on the needs of women affected by violence and our specific focus on the law. They amended our Vision statement to reflect this. The Vision statement is now

#### **Public benefit**

We have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aims and objectives and in planning our future activities.

Our Objects (set out above) are carried out for the public benefit as follows:-

Our services are restricted for the benefit of women but are available to all women in England and Wales.

Women experience many barriers to accessing the law and their legal rights. Existing or proposed new law and legal policy often discriminates against or disadvantages women as a whole or as members of a particular group.

Through all our services and activities detailed above we aim to ensure that all women have equal access to the law, their legal rights and justice. In this way we aim to ensure that women enjoy a more equal role in society.

Through our advice lines and publications women will benefit from increased knowledge and understanding and increased confidence in using the law enabling them to overcome the disadvantages they experience. In particular our services focus on supporting women affected by violence – recognised by the UN as one of the most significant discriminations faced by women.

Through our training we aim to increase awareness and understanding amongst the professionals who support women of the law as it relates to women enabling them to better support women and increasing their understanding of women's equality issues.

The legal issues we deal with include those affecting diverse groups of women including Black and Minority Ethnic including Refugees and asylum-seeking (BMER) women, and lesbian and bisexual women. Through our publications and training we aim to increase awareness and understanding of the issues affecting these groups of women.

Through our policy work we aim to ensure that the law and legal policy meets the needs of women and does not disadvantage them. We undertake research to demonstrate the impact of law and legal policy developments on women in order to raise awareness and lobby for changes which will ensure greater equality for women. Often our research focuses on specific groups of women, such as the impact of the legal aid scheme on BMER women. Our research and policy documents are disseminated to local and national Government, policy makers, statutory and voluntary sector organisations. We regularly meet with law and policy makers to discuss the impact on women and campaign for developments which ensure greater equality for women.

#### **Achievements and performance**

#### Advice line

In this period our telephone legal advice services have supported a total of 1906 women with advice and information on their legal rights in relation to family law, sexual violence and immigration and asylum law.

Our family and criminal law advice lines provided 1608 women with advice on family law issues including relationship breakdown, finance and children issues and/or with advice and support on the criminal justice process arising from domestic and/or sexual violence.

Our immigration and asylum law line provided advice and support to 298 individual women and professionals supporting women with an insecure immigration status.

During this period we recruited 8 new volunteer solicitors and barristers to support the delivery of our telephone advice lines. We would like to sincerely thank our nearly 40 volunteer legal advisers.

# **Training**

As part of the Ascent project we delivered a programme of 13 training courses throughout London, *All change: Contact and residence orders, the introduction of the new Single Family Court and legal aid.* 

In addition, with our funding from Unbound Philanthropy, we have delivered a series of training courses in partnership with other immigration and asylum organisations including *Seeking Refuge The asylum process and financial support for asylum seekers* in partnership with The Asylum Appeals Support Project, *Stop The Traffic* in partnership with The Anti-trafficking and Labour Exploitation Unit and *Domestic Violence and Persons Subject to Immigration Control* in partnership with the Immigration Law Practitioners Association. We also delivered a number of training days to staff at Refuge, *Finding a Way' – Non British National women benefits and entitlements*.

Following the publication of our research report *This is not my destiny*. *Reflecting on responses to forced marriage*, we were also funded to deliver a series of events raising awareness of the law relating to forced marriage by the Forced Marriage Unit.

With new funding from Trust for London and Comic Relief, we have developed a project to build the capacity of women's and other voluntary organisations to provide immigration advice through the Office of Immigration Services Commissioner (OISC) accreditation scheme.

In total this year we have delivered training and events to over 400 professionals throughout England and Wales.

#### **Publications**

Following significant changes to family law and procedure in April 2014 we published a series of new legal guides: Children and the law: child maintenance; Children and the law: relocation, holidays and abduction; Alternatives to the Family Court; A guide to marriage; Children and the law: when parents separate; Children and the law: the Family Court process; Children and the law: Parental Responsibility; and Family Court proceedings: where to get advice and support

With funding from Comic Relief we also published the following new and updated guides to immigration law: *Trafficking and the National Referral Mechanism; Women, Families and Article 8; Domestic Violence, Immigration Law and "no recourse to public funds";* and *Women, Families and Article 8* 

On 5 November 2014 we launched our new website, developed with funding from the Big Lottery. The website is a source of legal information for women. There have been nearly 85,000 downloads of our legal guides for women from the website this year.

#### Policy and campaigning

We have continued our focus on addressing the gaps in law and policy affecting women affected by violence. We sit on a range of key stakeholder groups including the Home Office's Violence Against Women and Girls Stakeholder Group, Foreign Office's Forced Marriage Stakeholders Group, the Crown Prosecution Service Violence Against Women External Consultation Group and the End Violence Against Women expert advisory panel. In partnership with Imkaan in February 2015 we published a research report *This is not my destiny. Reflecting on responses to forced marriage*. In December 2014, with Freshfields and Women's Aid, we hosted a roundtable meeting of experts to discuss domestic violence and the family justice system.

Our campaigning work against the cuts to legal aid with the publication of a further research report on their impact, *Evidencing domestic violence: reviewing the amended regulations* in November 2014. In April 2014 we issued judicial review proceedings against the Secretary of State for Justice in relation to the domestic violence evidence gateway for family law legal aid. Our application was dismissed following a hearing in December 2014 but we have been granted permission to appeal.

On immigration and asylum issues we have continued to attend the Asylum Aid Charter Group Meetings and the Home Office's National Asylum Stakeholder Forum and have spoken at a number of events on current policy and challenges arising from the Immigration Act 2014 and the legal aid changes.

#### Financial review

In this period Rights of Women has had 2 major sources of income:-

**Grants and donation** from a broad range of sources including major grant givers such as the Big Lottery Fund and Comic Relief, trusts and foundations such as Unbound Philanthropy and the Esmee Fairburn Foundation and statutory funders such as the Forced Marriage Unit. As part of the London Violence against Women and Girls Consortium we receive funding for the Ascent project from London Councils. We also receive donations and smaller grants from individuals and corporate partners such as Garden Court Chambers.

**Income generating activities** include our supporters' scheme, the sale of our publications and our training courses and other events.

As part of the new strategic plan the Board of Trustees is committed to a review of our fundraising strategy to ensure a diverse income base so that Rights of Women is as financially secure as possible and our work continues. Our 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary in 2015 gives rise to opportunities for increasing awareness of the organisation and its work and for fundraising from individuals.

The Board has designated funds to meet contractual obligations in respect of staffing and administrative costs and is committed to ensuring that the level of reserves held represents at least 6 months running costs.

#### TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES STATEMENT

The trustees (who are also the directors of Rights of Women Incorporated Limited for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under that law the trustees have elected to prepare the financial statements in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards and applicable law). - prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2015

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### **Basis of accounting**

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable United Kingdom accounting standards and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' issued in March 2005 (SORP 2005).

#### Cash flow statement

The trustees have taken advantage of the exemption in Financial Reporting Standard No 1 (revised) from including a cash flow statement in the financial statements on the grounds that the charity is small.

# **Fund accounting**

- Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity. Unrestricted funds include a revaluation reserve representing the restatement of investment assets at market values.
- Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the Management Committee for particular purposes.
- Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor or through the terms of an appeal.

#### **Incoming resources**

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- Voluntary income is received by way of grants, donations and gifts and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable. Grants, where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant.
- Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be
  quantified. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included in these
  accounts.

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# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2015

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

- Investment income is included when receivable.
- Incoming resources from grants, where related to performance and specific deliverables, are accounted for as the charity earns the right to consideration by its performance.

### Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates:

- Costs of generating funds comprise the costs associated with attracting voluntary income and the costs of trading for fundraising purposes.
- Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.
- Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the audit or examination costs, and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity.
- All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the SoFA on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly, others are apportioned on an appropriate basis e.g. floor areas, per capita or estimated usage as set out in the notes to the accounts.

#### **Fixed assets**

Fixed assets (excluding investments) are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. The costs of minor additions or those costing below £250 are not capitalised.

#### **Depreciation**

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Equipment - straight line basis over 4 or 6.67 years

#### 23. INVESTMENT

The charity owns one share (20%) in Tindlemanor Limited, which owns the freehold property in which the charity has its offices. Tindlemanor Limited has not had a valuation of the freehold property. There is uncertainty about the situation should Tindlemanor be wound up. The charity has not included the share held in Tindlemanor within its assets as it feels that a full valuation of the shares and the property itself would be needed to provide an accurate figure, and the trustees feel that the costs of these valuations would outweigh the benefits of so doing.
